Winter, the most beloved and Hallmarked time of the year. Most of us here at Cascade will be celebrating Christmas this year, along with the other 95% of America. You might be wondering what the aforementioned 5% does while some drink eggnog and wait for Santa, and it's not as different as you might think. Most winter holidays share a lot of common ground, which a lot of people don't realize. Let's go through some common winter holidays and see what overlaps.

Christmas

Christmas is the most popular holiday/cash cow in the world, and a traditionally Christian holiday. Before Jesus of Nazareth was recognized, mid-winter holidays were still going strong. After Jesus was done roaming the Earth, the Church used Easter as the main holiday to celebrate him and his following. Around the sixth century, the Christians felt the need to celebrate a winter holiday as well and decided to celebrate Christ's birthday on December 25th, which is the same date as the Roman's winter holiday (Saturnalia) that isn't important enough to get its own section. Pope Julius officialized Christmas day in 432 and our beloved holiday was born.

Hanukkah

Although Hanukkah is capitalized similar to Christmas, it's a very minor holiday for Jews. Unlike Christmas and Saturnalia, Hanukkah is a moving holiday spanning eight days (this year falling on the 22nd through the 30th, and last year landing on the 2nd through 10th.) This is because it follows the lunar calendar, which is also the reason Easter moves. The celebration started after the Jewish people rose up from their oppressors in the Maccabean revolt. They needed light every night for their survival but only had enough oil to keep one night illuminated. The untainted olive oil managed to last them eight nights, which was therefore known as the Hanukkah miracle and was henceforth celebrated yearly.

Yule

Yule, if nothing else, takes the belt as the oldest winter holiday. Traditionally, Yule starts on the winter solstice and continues for the next 11 days. We can thank the Pagans and other Hellenistic worshipers for starting these festivities, which include feasting, burning a sacrificial log, and tying bells to any and everything you can. The idea was to welcome winter and ask the season to be merciful to the people who celebrated her coming. Whether or not winter cared (or had the capacity to care) is up to speculation and superstition, but the festivities are interesting nonetheless.

Kwanzaa

Unlike all previously mentioned holidays, Kwanzaa has been up and operating for only 53 years. Kwanzaa is celebrated on December 26th through January 1st. This holiday was introduced as an alternative Christmas for people of African descent after caucasian citizens expressed disdain over sharing traditions with different races. The founder of the holiday, a man named Karenga, made seven principles for the holiday and declared festivities every year from there on out.
